Reflections from the Pastor

"Believe It or Not, Grace Takes Practice"

The other day as I was preparing

to run some errands, my dear wife Vicki was listening to a webinar on speaker. At one point the person leading the course commented, "Believe it or not, Grace Takes *Practice.*" Over the past few days I was wrestling with what I would write about this month -- that is until I

heard the above phrase. I said to myself, "that's it, I am going to write about grace."

Grace is a word that gets thrown around a lot. Whether inside or outside the church, we hear the word grace used in many ways. In the example I overheard, the leader was speaking about the ways we can learn to be gracious toward ourselves. In this

context the person was referring to grace in terms of self-affirmation, or seeing the value of oneself in the world. This fits very well with the spirit of the word grace, which means seeing grace as a gift, as a way of giving ourselves the gift of favor and acceptance, which is not based on achievement. It's not something we can earn or receive through the fulfillment of certain requirements. Whether we experience grace from others, or show grace to others, what we are describing is the gift of loving acceptance, favor, goodwill, mercy, and understanding for everyone.

Dan Jeremy, from the 12th century, passes along his "Summary of God's Grace," when he writes, "The gospel is all about God's grace through Jesus Christ, which is why Paul calls it 'the gospel of the grace of God.' (Acts 20:24) and 'the word of his grace.' (Acts 14:3). The gospel of the grace of God is the message



everyone needs. The word of grace is proclaimed from every page of the Bible and ultimately revealed in Jesus Christ. The last verse of the Bible summarizes the message from Genesis to Revelation: 'The grace of the Lord Jesus be with all.' (Rev. 22:21) It is through Jesus 'we have all received grace upon grace' (John 1:16)—the gratuitous and undomesticated grace of God."

Two mystics from the medieval era described their own experiences of the transforming impact of God's

grace in their lives. Catherine of Siena, an Italian Mystic of the 14th century, prayed that God would give to her a "perfect love of her fellow human beings." As a result, Catherine had a vision where "the Lord appeared to her, removed her

heart, and gave her his own heart." Hildegard of Bingen, from the 12th century, saw God as "a flaming light of marvelous brightness, like a flame that warms, even as the rays of the sun strike the earth." Her life was always dictated "by inward commands," and the focus of her life was to help people to "know the ways of the Lord."

When it comes to grace, if our goal is the warm and loving acceptance of

all people, creating a church and world where "all are welcome, always," then we need practice. The experience of the deep care and kindness expressed to us through God's grace can be difficult to embrace. The expression of that loving grace toward ourselves or

others does not come naturally. Henri Nouwen has a way of helping us to begin this journey of practicing grace by inviting us to consider a series of questions to guide our steps. The questions are as follows: "Did I offer peace

us to answer the others. We can first ask, "how am I to be let myself be loved by God?" In other words, "how can I allow myself to receive God's grace?"

I believe it's the answer to this question that can put us in

> touch with the basic truth and the gift of God's grace. It becomes the basis for applying this loving presence in the world toward ourselves and others. This grace is radically unpredictable, life affirming, and incalculably important. It is the gift of unconditional love, favor, and

acceptance. Let's practice.
